



Technology changes behavior

- With increased communications capability, we communicate rather than plan
- With increased search capability, we search rather than categorize



Technology tends to evolve through three phases¹

The next generation of Moore's law: This time, it is written media

- Decomposition of value added
 - Publishers become filters, agents, and editors
 - Newspapers write for net first, ceding opinions to independents and focusing on investigations
 - Authors join musicians in becoming performers rather than producers
- Search replaces categorization
 - Categorizers less important
 - Manipulation of context is big business
 - Search engine optimization now larger than \$1b
 - Search becoming the new interface
- Knowledge about information and search behavior more valuable than the information itself
 - "The database of intentions"





Management implications:

- Understand and secure involvement
- Carefully portion your own participation
 - Too much skews the incentives to participate
 - Too little makes forum irrelevant
- Reward participation, but not with money
- Encourage risky behavior
- Resist individual information ownership

Popwar, Il NetAttivismo contro l'ordine costituito

con un network di telefonia cellulare, il nuovo nodo (utente) non è un aggravio - di costo e di performance - sul sistema bensì è un elemento in aggiunta che porta un miglioramento della performance del network19.

I mesh network hanno infine anche un'altra caratteristica graditissima al NetAttivismo: come fa notare Espen Andersen, 20 "è un modo di costruire network sostanzialmente impossibile per le aziende [di telecomunicazione NdA], o quantomeno impossibile da realizzare in un modo tale che vi sia per loro un ritorno economico". In altre parole questo tipo di network sono la strada alternativa alle telco che le telco non possono percorrere o sulla quale non possono cercare di mettere il cappello. Tanto che lo stesso Andersen aggiunge: "Se fossi a capo di una società di telecomunicazioni sarei molto nervoso al pensiero di una tecnologia per la creazione di network che può essere implementata dai singoli individui". Una tecnologia che non a caso - pur in un momento di estrema difficoltà del business IT – sta vedendo (al di là del colosso Intel che ha fatto della filosofia mesh uno dei suoi campi prioritari di sviluppo) una ventina di aziende, soprattutto della Silicon Vallev e dintorni, impegnate nella messa a punto di software e strumenti per architetture mesh²¹.

Certo, lo sviluppo di questo tipo di architettura tecnologica ha le sue difficoltà oggettive; per certi aspetti il punto di forza è anche punto di debolezza: proprio per la loro caratteristica di flessibilità e adattabilità, i mesh network sono infatti intrinsecamente precari: i pacchetti di dati viaggiano cioè su percorsi disegnati da nodi che compaiono e scompaiono costantemente. A ciò si aggiunge il problema tipico di una trasmissione wireless che richiede la portata ottica e cioè l'assenza di ostacoli ambientali come edifici, alberi e colline. Tutte difficoltà che non esistono nel tradizionale network wired.

Ancora una volta risuona profetica la frase di Kevin Kelly: "Dumb parts, properly connected into a swarm, yield smart results" In questo caso le parti "stupide" sono i singoli strumenti di trasmissione, la parte intelligente è il risultante network auto-configurante e altamente organizzato.
